Key Stage 1 Homework

Dear Parents/Carers,

Starting from this week, pupils in Key Stage 1 will be set weekly homework tasks. This will consist of a mixture of spellings, number games and reading.

Spelling and number homework will be completed online, whilst reading books and records will be sent home in reading bags. Please ensure that reading books and records are sent into school each day, so that adults working with your child can also read with them. Your child's username and password for the online websites can be found either on the inside cover of their reading record or will be sent home separately.

An outline of homework set is as follows:

	Times Tables Rockstars is for Year 2 only.	Times Tables Rockstars at: http://ttrockstars.com	There are levels and stages which pupils need to pass to move on. Certificates for this will be handed out in Key Stage assembly each week.



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Reading	Books are changed weekly.	A reading book and record will be sent home in book bags.	Pupils read regularly throughout the week, re-reading books to build up their pace and fluency.
		Rocket Phonics	An adult is to date and sign the reading record after reading.
			Reading books should be in school daily.

Reading

Reading forms an essential part of the curriculum and daily reading is strongly encouraged to help pupils to build up their self-esteem and self-confidence.

Your child will bring home one or two quality texts each week matched to their reading ability, which they are required to read and then re-read throughout the week. The purpose of rereading the book is to help them to build up fluency and pace (how quickly they can read the words). The re-reading of books also helps to develop comprehension (their understanding of what is happening in the story).

To help support parents with home reading the following is recommended as a guide when reading:

	New book			
1 st read	Look at the front cover, find the title and look at the illustration.			
	What do you think this book will be about?			
	 Look at the inside cover and read the sounds and common exception words. 			
	 Begin to read the book, taking time to decode the words (applying your phonics to recognise what the word says). 			
2 nd read	Re-read the book including the inside cover.			
	How did the story end? Did you like the story?

3 rd read	Re-read the book including the inside cover.			
	 Talk to an adult about what happened in the story. 			
	Can you name some key events which happened?			
4 th read	Re-read the book.			
	Find and point to all the characters in the story.			
	 Recognise the setting of the story (which place does the story happen in?)
